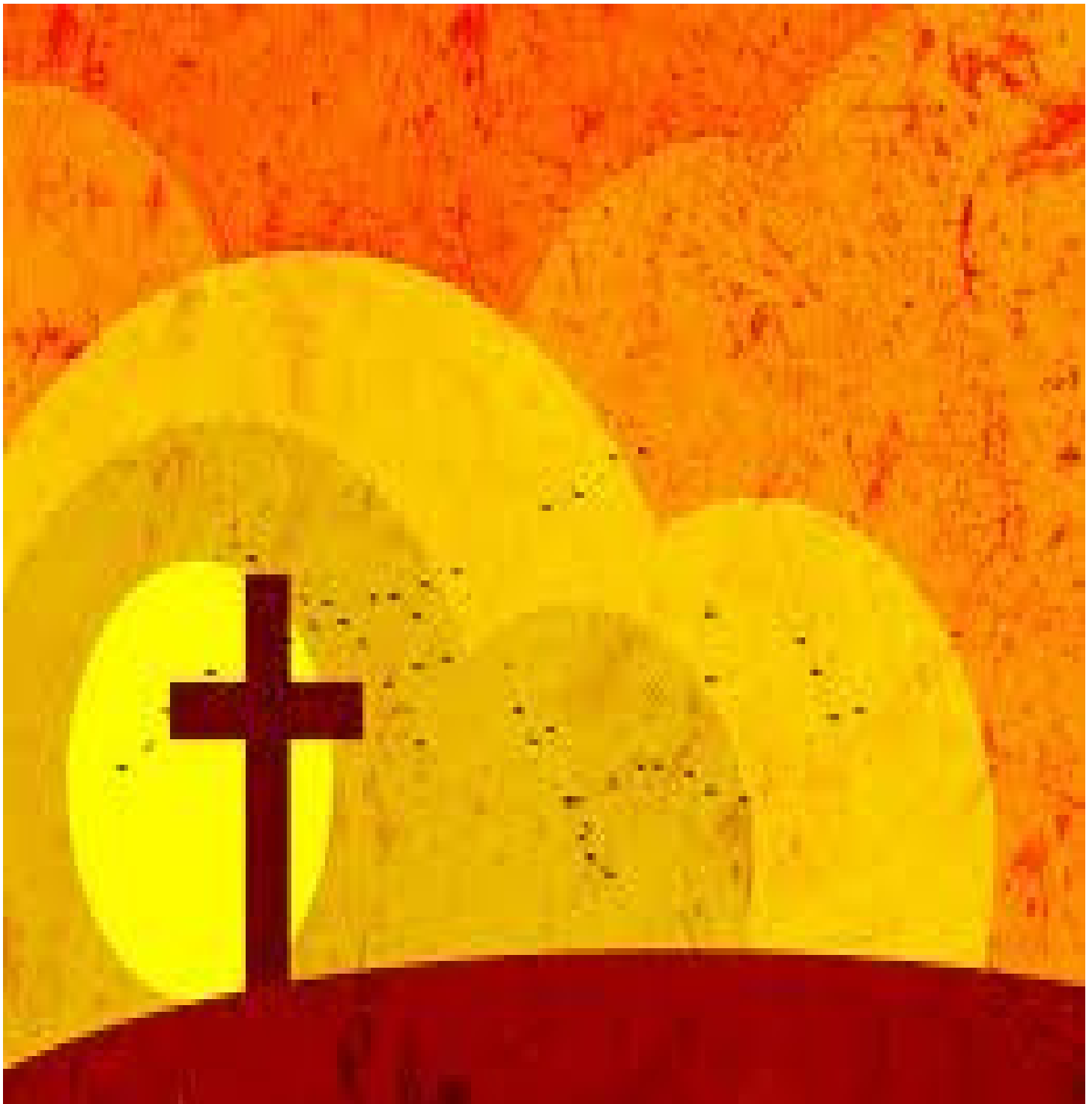

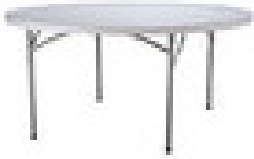

## **Each One, Reach One!**

Wow! Already been at Wesley for 3 months! "Time flies when you're having fun!" And it has been an exciting start for Dicie Rue and me here. We look forward to many more years of service and ministry with you.

I'm reading a new book by a pastor to an urban culture in Austin, Texas (Jonathan K. Dodson) who was raised in an East Texas Baptist environment, but felt the Lord leading him to minister in a challenging place like Austin. In starting a church there, he found the going tough and almost gave up. Like one convert the first year and small growth a few years after that. Yet, he remained faithful and now the Lord is growing a new, disciple-minded church. I want to share a paragraph out of that book with you.

*... "there is value in growing in our knowledge and understanding of the Gospel itself. The Gospel acts as a grand apologetic by addressing the deepest of life's questions: the value of creation, the problem of evil and suffering, the existence of God, the hope of salvation, the nature of God and man, and the role of faith. The story line of the Bible is an explanatory narrative that accounts for our deepest longings and hopes, while narrating a world we all want. It begins and ends with a perfect world--just, joyful, beautiful, intimate, fruitful, creative, and full of peace. The story of Scripture also acknowledges most of our objections to the way the world currently is--unjust, sad, lonely, cursed, barren, and broken. ...the Bible goes further, identifying the problem--the world order, the sinful longings of 'the flesh', and the devil himself--as well as providing the solution--the life, death, resurrection, and return of Jesus Christ our Lord."*

The Great Commission tells us to "Go into all the world, make disciples for Jesus Christ, baptize all in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and then teach obedience to all of Jesus' commands." When Jesus was asked about the Greatest Commandment, He responded essentially with "Love God and Love your neighbor." My observation over the past 40+ years in ministry is that most church folk get the "Love God" part pretty good, but we are lacking and lagging behind in the "Love Neighbors" department. Why is this? Are we ashamed of the Gospel of Christ

we proclaim in word, deed, and song? Are we embarrassed to "tell the world we are Christians?" Have we lost our "first love" described by John in Revelation 2:2-7? Have we, in the modern vernacular "been there, done that and even bought a t-shirt? " Have we become so "professional in ministry" that we expect "the pastor" to handle this area of our Biblical witness? (We ALL are ministers at Wesley UMC!) Are we just "too busy" with everything else in our lives that we are too tired and weary to do "another thing at church?" Or, what would you say it is?

Years ago, I discovered one day in my quiet time a singular thought about "how" to reach out to grow the church. I call it, "EACH ONE, REACH ONE." It is very simple math: every person take the pledge to be responsible for asking just one person to attend Wesley, perhaps taking them with you to Sunday school or involve she/he in one of our programs (Sunday school, choir, UMW, Backpack Buddies, shut-ins, etc.), and maybe even take them out to lunch or home with you. It can be ANYONE--which means family, neighbors, co-workers, or friends. So if 75 of us take the pledge for the next six months, it is possible that we could have 75 new or even restored members in our church. Then we repeat the pledge with others or the same for another 6 months...well, you get the gist of this "each one, reach one" pledge/covenant. Let's make it a matter of prayer...each of us...and see how the Lord leads us. "You never know what you're gonna get when you pray about it."

What a JOY it is to be your pastor and to serve alongside you. So many of you are committee and loyal servants for our Lord here at Wesley and I thank you for your willingness to do all that you're doing. Great days are happening now and they are ahead for us

#### Adopt a Backpack Buddy

Each year we are given the opportunity to adopt a Backpack Buddy.

We will be giving weekly food to children at North Hopkins ISD and to children at Como-Pickton CISD (usually the number of children served is 100 or so).

Included in the bag each child receives each week is:

2 breakfast items such as instant oatmeal or granola bars

2 lunch items such as ravioli or beans and wieners

2 snack items such as peanut butter crackers or pudding cups

2 drinks such as fruit punch or Yoo Hoo

The menu varies each week. The cost of the food given each week is \$3.00. When you adopt a Backpack Buddy, you may give your money by the week, month or year.

The Backpack Buddy display will be in the sanctuary and the backpack magnets are on the display. Please take one (or two). You may go together with someone to adopt a Buddy or Sunday school classes may choose to adopt several.

Hello Wesley Family,

Today, as I write this letter, is the first full day of fall. This morning was crisp and clear. I took in a deep breath and thanked God for his many blessings.

Wesley will soon be deep in Fall Roundup preparations. Fall Roundup is scheduled for 1 November. Proceeds are always earmarked for a special fund. This fund is selected through a called meeting of the Administrative Board, discussions from church members and a deciding vote from the Board members. **We have scheduled that called meeting for 7 October at 6:30 p.m. in the Wesleyan classroom.** This meeting is especially important because Wesley always needs some tender loving care (TLC). As this is an open meeting, every church member can attend and voice their opinions. This meeting allows each of us the opportunity to speak up and reach out to our fellow parishioners. If you have a special project for which you would like to see the Fall Roundup proceeds dedicated, this is the meeting to attend. If you need transportation to the meeting, please let the church office know early, so we can have someone pick you up.

As we enter this fall season, we focus on gathering, harvesting, canning, and thanking God for our abundance. Even in our pain, brokenness, and despair, we take time to celebrate. We know that God gave us Jesus so we would know “the way” to everlasting life. Beyond the hugs, shaking of hands, pats on the back, generous smiles and gifts of gab found whenever Wesley gathers, there is a generous outpouring of love for our fellow man. When Wesley gives to missions such as Little Acorn School, backpack buddies, or to freeing missions in deepest Africa, Mexico, or right here at home, we give our love and support. Wesley has open arms for all who enter. Those who have grown in faith in Wesley know this love. It is the love of Jesus Christ. God loves us so much that he gave his Son to die for our sins, that we may be forgiven and have everlasting life. Our minister sums it all up when he proclaims, “We are Wesley!”

Here is a short history lesson about John Wesley and the evening his heart became “strangely warmed.”

### **John Wesley’s Heart Strangely Warmed**

John Wesley was almost in despair. He did not have the faith to continue to preach. When death stared him in the face, he was fearful and found little comfort in his religion. To Peter Bohler, a Moravian friend, he confessed his growing misery and decision to give up the ministry. Bohler counseled otherwise. “Preach faith till you have it,” he advised. “And then because you have it, you will preach faith.” A wise Catholic once made a similar statement: “Act as if you have faith and it will be granted to you.”

John acted on the advice. He led a prisoner to Christ by preaching faith in Christ alone for forgiveness of sins. The prisoner was immediately converted. John was astonished. He had been struggling for years. Here was a man transformed instantly. John made a study of the New Testament and found to his astonishment that the longest recorded delay in salvation was three days—while the Apostle Paul waited for his eyes to open.

The Moravians assured him their personal experiences had also been instantaneous. John found himself crying out, “Lord, help my unbelief!” However, he felt dull within and little motivated even to pray for his own salvation. On this day, May 24th, 1738, he opened his Bible at about five in the morning and came across these words, “There are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises, even that ye should partakers of the divine nature.” He read similar words in other places.

That evening he reluctantly attended a meeting in Aldersgate. Someone read from Luther’s Preface to the Epistle to Romans. About 8:45 p.m., ***“While he was describing the change which God works in the heart through faith in Christ, I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone for salvation; and an assurance was given me that He had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death.”***

It took him some time to learn how to live the life of faith, for he was not always possessed of joy and thought he had fallen from salvation. It took time for him to see that it is not Christ and good works, but Christ alone who saves, resulting in good works.

As time went on, John Wesley was mightily used of the Lord to reform England. His Methodists became a national force. John rode thousands of miles (as many as 20,000 a year) preaching as only a man filled with the Holy Spirit can preach, telling the Gospel to all who would listen. He acted “as though he were out of breath in pursuit of souls.” Wherever he preached, lives changed and manner and morals altered for the better. It is often conjectured that his preaching helped spare England the kind of revolution that occurred in France.

Please plan on attending the called Administrative Board meeting called for October 7 at 6:30 p.m. in the Wesleyan classroom. Your enthusiastic support will be appreciated.

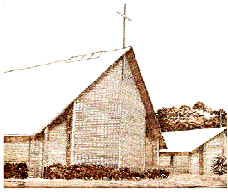


### Used Printer Cartridges Needed
