

MOTHER'S DAY is a celebration honoring the mother of the family, as well as motherhood, maternal bonds, and the influence of mothers in society. It is celebrated on various days in many part of the world, most commonly in the months of March or May. It complements similar celebrations honoring family members, such as Father's Day and Siblings Day.

In the United States, celebration of Mother's Day began in the early 20th century. It is not related to the many celebrations of mothers and motherhood that have occurred throughout the world over thousands of years, such as the Greek cult to Cybele, the Roman festival of Hilaria, or the Christian Mothering Sunday celebration (originally a commemoration of Mother Church, not motherhood). In some countries, Mother's Day has become synonymous with these older traditions.

In 1912 Anna Jarvis trademarked the phrases "second Sunday in May" and "Mother's Day," and created the Mother's Day International Association. She specifically noted that "Mother's" should "be a singular possessive, for each family to honor its own mother, not a plural possessive commemorating all mothers in the world. This is also the spelling used by President Woodrow Wilson in his 1914 presidential proclamation, by the U.S. Congress in relevant bills, and by various U.S. presidents in their proclamations concerning Mother's Day.

Saddle Up and Hold On Tight!

Inside every man is a little boy who wants to be a man. I'm not sure why. I do not know if someone else has said it. It just "popped into my noggin!" Yet, I think it is also true for the opposite sex: inside every woman is a little girl who wants to be a woman. This is where I am going: when the Apostle Paul wrote his great Love Chapter in I Corinthians 13, toward the end he declared: "When I became a man, I put away childish things." (The New Living Translation says: "When I grew up, I put away childish things.)

We spend our years growing up from being dependent to becoming independent and finishing up being dependent once again. Life can be "a tale told by an idiot full of sound and fury" (MacBeth in Shakespeare). We are explicitly told by the Apostle Peter to "grow in the grace and knowledge of the Lord Jesus." I am encouraged when I read that from a disciple that once denied Jesus even after he said though others would fall away or leave Jesus by himself, he would never do it. Yes, we do know the rest of that story: he did! But Jesus always had a special place in his heart for denying, doubting, and even betraying disciples not only like Peter, Thomas, and Judas, but also we 21st-century ones! We may give up, but God in Christ will never give up on us. No matter how mature or immature we may be or behave like, we are never forgotten or alone. God is always with us...even if it takes us a long time to mature in our faith journey. The hymnist puts it in these words:

From sinking sand, He lifted me. With tender hand, He lifted me.

From shades of night to plains of lights; O praise His name, He lifted me!

In May we will complete HCI Prescription One: forging a new Vision Statement (Who we are and how we address our mission to "make Disciples for Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world). We'll celebrate Mother's Day on Sunday, May 8, with Muffins with Mom and learn more about the mother and prostitute, Rahab, in our worship service. Should be interesting. We'll celebrate Pentecost Sunday on May 15 by wearing RED and being connected to the power of the Holy Spirit. Our fifth Sunday service will be led by Joe Clark and our youth. It's the Sunday before Memorial Day, 2016, as we pause to salute the men and women who have died in military service of our country. It was formerly known as Decoration Day when family and friends decorated the graves of their loved ones. Today we often think this is when summer officially starts, so we go

boating and swimming on the lakes, and we have those family cookouts and picnics. Folks, let us never forget those who gave their lives for the freedoms (just noted) we enjoy!


