Veterans Day

Veterans Day (originally known as **Armistice Day**) is a federal holiday in the United States observed annually on November 11, for honoring military veterans, that is, persons who have served in the United States Armed Forces (and were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable. It coincides with other holidays including Armistice Day and Remembrance Day which are celebrated in other countries that mark the anniversary of the end of World War I.

Major hostilities of World War I were formally ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918, when the Armistice Germany went into effect. At the urging of major U.S. veteran organizations, Armistice Day was renamed Veterans Day in 1954.

Veterans Day is distinct from Memorial Day, a U.S. public holiday in May. Veterans Day celebrated the service of all U.S. military veterans, while Memorial Day honors those who have *died* while in military service. There is another military holiday, Armed Forces Day, a minor U.S. remembrance that also occurs in May, which honors those *currently serving* in the U.S. military.

Gratitude and Appreciation

Over the river and through the woods to
grandfather's house we go. The horse knows the
way the carry the sleigh through white and drifted
snow.

Over the river and through the wood to have a
first-rate play. Hear the bells ring, ting-a-ling!
Hurrah for Thanksgiving Day!

This children's song was first published in 1844 as a poem by Lydia Maria Child. In time, an unknown composer set the poem to music and many of us learned it in our elementary years. Additionally, it was to "grandfather's house we go" but over time, it was changed to "grandmother's house." And, finally, this song was written to celebrate Thanksgiving Day and not Christmas Day. Now you know "the rest of the story."

The gradual change of this 12 verse/poem illustrates how people can so easily be led to quickly pass on the wonderful and meaningful Thanksgiving holiday in the every-maddening Christmas rush, decorating of lights and garland, and a passing nod to the meaning of the "Christ-Mass." (A celebration of the glorious and unique birth of Christ the Lord.)

Even Halloween candy, costumes, and decorations get more attention than Thanksgiving—and debate about the real purpose of Halloween tilts more to it having pagan roots as opposed to Christian roots. The closest tie to Christianity is that All Hallows Eve is the evening before All Saints Day on November 1. Traditionally, in Ireland and Scotland, a three-day feast included the celebration of their Christian saints as well as honoring the recently departed folk.

Similar Holy Days-holidays were observed all the way back to Egyptian, Roman, and Celtic influences. In Germany and Austria, for example, groups of poor people, often children, would go door to door collecting Soul Cakes in exchange for praying for the recently deceased in their communities. These cakes had the sign of the Cross on them and, for some, serve as a precursor to the practice of Trick or Treating today.

Some folks still believe that Halloween is simply a Christianization of a pagan holiday. I do know for many children, Halloween is a time of playing dress-up and going door-to-door and surprising their neighbors with the trick or treat greeting!. The intended result is to receive candy –hopefully wrapped-and other treats. I have yet to have a child offer me a trick. Treats are always preferred!

Back to Thanksgiving. See how much fun Halloween extracts from me! Traditionally, Americans retell the story of a group of Pilgrims who sailed on a boat name the Mayflower and left England for religious freedom in what is now Cape Cod, Massachusetts. A Native American greeted these Pilgrims in English. He soon left and returned with another Native American of the Pawtuxet Tribe, Squanto, who had been kidnapped by an English sea captain, sold into slavery, and escaped in London, and returned to America on an exploratory expedition. It was Squanto who taught the Pilgrims how to cultivate corn, extract sap from maple trees, catch fish in the rivers, and also avoid poisonous plants.

Squanto also helped them to forge an alliance with the

Wampanoag, a local tribe which endured for over 50 years. William Bradford was elected governor of what became known as the Massachusetts Bay Colony and in November, 1621, organized a celebratory feast in honor of a successful harvest that year. The festival lasted more than three days with Chief and Massasoit and 90 members of the Wampanoag Tribe.

In 1789, President Washington issued the first Thanksgiving proclamation calling the country to express its gratitude for the conclusion of the War of Independence from England and also the ratifying of the a new United States of American Constitution.

Other president followed suit, but it was not until 1863, at the height of the Civil War (the War between the States) that President Abraham Lincoln issued a proclamation for all Americans to "ask God to commend to His tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife and to heal the wounds of the nation." It was set for the fourth Thursday in November. Except for 1939 and 1940, Thanksgiving has been held on this day.

The two words-Gratitude and Appreciation—are key words for Thanksgiving. The dictionary defines gratitude as "the quality of being thankful; readiness to show appreciation for all and to return kindness." Appreciation is "the recognition of the good qualities of someone or something."

Our Bible tell us this: "In all things, give thanks." (I Thessalonians 5:18) But that is not the whole of the verse! The final phrase is: "for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus."

"Give thanks, with a grateful heart, give thanks to the Holy One; Give thanks because He's given Jesus Christ His Son, Give thanks. And now let the weak say I am strong, let the poor say I am rich. Because of what the Lord has done for us, give thanks! Give thanks!

Pastor and Staff Recognition Day was a surprise to each of us. How grateful we are to minister together at Wesley UMC. The kinds words of appreciation from sever folks were received in our hearts and minds. It is music to my ears when I often hear some at Wesley say to one another, "I appreciate you" and/or simply, "Thank you!"

Thanksgiving is the season of gratitude and appreciation. Psalm 100 reminds us to "Serve the Lord with gladness."

Together we can do this!
